*Request fee/deposit waiver for Talleyrand Park re: Wrestling Exhibition on July 19*

**Duffey moved to add the Bellefonte Wrestling Program to the non-profit list for fee waivers;**  
**Johnson seconded the motion;**

Tosti-Vasey clarified that waivers for non-profits cover only usage fee and not the application fee. Brachbill was concerned about the ease of getting on to the non-profit waiver list. Tosti-Vasey stated that the listing is comprised of only 501(c) (3) non-profits that are Bellefonte based. She questioned whether or not the wrestling team was a registered non-profit in Bellefonte. Holderman stated that the only funding that the team would have would be from the booster club. He also mentioned that this particular group of students had painted the bridge for the Borough at least three times. Mayor Wilson interjected that he does not believe that all of the non-profits were 501(c) (3) non-profits when the list was devised, and it was just a coincidence that all of them on the list were. The list is flexible. Holderman stated that he believed that the list was compiled due to the nature of HBI coming in to make their requests on an annual basis. Brachbill wished to see some consistency.

Tosti-Vasey believed the prior conversations on this topic yielded that the non-profit had to be based in Bellefonte. Since the school district is based in Bellefonte, the team meets the qualification. Brachbill stated that the request can be approved without them being added to the official listing of non-profits. Prendergast interjected that only those on the list can be approved for waivers. Council created this rule and the rule can be changed.

Brachbill called the question.

***Email from B. Reiter re: HOPE Initiative***

This is a request to place purple lights and/or ribbons on the suspension bridge in Talleyrand Park to symbolize understanding addiction. The lights would be up during the month of August.

**Brachbill moved to approve the request to place purple lights or ribbons for the Hope Initiative on the suspension bridge at the park;  
Johnson seconded the motion;**

Hombosky had concerns about the kids throwing the ribbons into the creek.

**Motion carried.**

***Bellefonte Relay for Life Letter re: Talleyrand***

This letter is a request to use the extension area of Talleyrand Park. This would be for next May for the overnight Relay for Life.

Tosti-Vasey suggested them coming in for a work session to find out what their ideas are and work things out together. Hombosky did have concern about the tents and the sleep over aspect of the Relay. She would like to know a little more about this.

***Willowbank Street Crossing – newspaper***

Stewart stated that the press release states that the work is scheduled for July 9 and 10, 2018. Flaggers will be used to control traffic as the intersection will not be closed. They will do one side of the road on one day and the other side of the road the other day. They will work from 8:30 a.m. to about 4:30 p.m. The Borough staff told them to avoid rush hours.

***First stakeholders meeting for Spring Creek Watershed Update Project***

Stewart stated that the Spring Creek Watershed Commission stakeholders will meet July 10 at 6:30 at the Calvary Harvest Fields in Boalsburg.

Tosti-Vasey stated that she received an email from Caitlen Teti from the Clearwater Conservancy and she stated that online registration should be available now on the Spring Creek Watershed Commission website. Interested persons may also call 717-480-6359 to register. Advance registration is required.

***CATA Draft FY 2018-19 Budget***

The draft 2018-19 CATA budget was discussed. The Borough's portion of the budget is \$23,237.00 which includes operating and capital contributions. Stewart stated that it will be approved this month and then effective July 1.

***Email re: Update re: Special CCMPO meeting in July***

Stewart discussed the update of the Special CCMPO meeting in July. It is scheduled for Tuesday, July 31 at 6 p.m. at the Patton Township Building. Funding for I-99 and I-80 will be discussed. PennDOT is matching the funds and they want action by the coordinating committee.

Tosti-Vasey inquired about the difference between the “attainment area” and the “maintenance area” mentioned in the information. Johnson will find out the answer to that question.

***Memo re: Potter Street Crosswalk***

Stewart stated that a business owner (Good Intent Cider) is interested in putting a crosswalk at Potter Street. PennDOT stated it is a local street and due to liability concerns, they are recommending that the Borough speak with a transportation planning engineer to make sure the site distances are acceptable. The plan itself has been approved and sealed.

**Prendergast moved to approve the spending of up to \$400.00 out of the General Fund for a traffic study and to ask Good Intent Cider to contribute \$100.00 towards the study;  
Duffey seconded the motion;**

Brachbill agreed with the contribution. If they do not pay, funds from the general fund can be justified as it would benefit the public as a crosswalk. Additional signage cost was discussed briefly.

**Motion carried.**

***Email from Deb Berger – Hometown Heroes Committee***

Stewart stated that Berger is asking Borough Council to name the new section of Talleyrand Park something to the effect of “First Responder Field at Talleyrand Park.” A lot of first responders inquired about the hometown heroes program but because it is focused on veterans, they were turned down. This is only a suggestion. Stewart recommended getting input from the Talleyrand Park Committee and the Council Parks and Recreation Committee members.

Hombosky will present this request to the Talleyrand Park Committee for input.

***Chalk the Walk***

Stewart stated that this event will take place on July 1, 2018. Hombosky stated that this is a fundraiser for Downtown Bellefonte, Inc. (previously Belle Key). One can purchase a square for \$15.00. This is open to businesses, non-profits, and families. There are three categories that will be judged, and prizes will be awarded. The event will take place 10-3 p.m. on July 1.

## **SPECIAL COMMITTEE REPORTS:**

### **Safety Committee Meeting Minutes June 13, 2018 Draft**

Brachbill attended the Safety Committee Meeting. He commended the staff and employees on having no accidents or close calls this year.

### **Centre County Airport Authority Meeting report – Johnson**

Johnson reported that the airport was awarded a grant for airport expansions in the amount of \$2.2 million to be used for a new parking lot that will be between the FedEx building and existing terminal. A land acquisition has been affected with Federal Express. The land will meet with Alexander Drive. The new parking lot will also have a new stormwater facility. There will be a new bus station incorporated and handicap accessible parking will be relocated in front of the terminal. The work will take about two years. It is all jet service at the airport now. Total project will be about \$8 million.

### **Centre Area Cable Consortium (CACC) meeting update – Eaton**

Eaton attended the CACC meeting last Monday. The meeting was an executive session meeting to determine funding for C-NET and also support for C-NET facilities. The Board agreed to propose a .96 per subscriber fee to Comcast as a negotiation point for the funding of C-NET. They wish to upgrade all C-NET broadcasts to HD and add remote origination points. They want to increase video on demand to 60 hours per week. Currently it is at 30 hours per week. They want C-NET to appear on the digital guide. Eaton proposed programming-based fee at the CACC meeting but that did not carry.

### **IDA Meeting Minutes June 14, 2018 Draft**

Holderman stated that there was an IDA meeting last week. Commissioner Higgins spoke with the Authority about opportunity zones and mentioned that the County Commissioners had recommended Bellefonte Borough (as one of four municipalities recommended), and the Governor and Federal Government approved all four municipalities. Bellefonte is in the opportunity zone now.

Historical signage is still outstanding. Megan Tooker has been working this for about a year and a half and is close to completing the task.

### **Spring Creek Watershed Commission**

Spring Creek Watershed Commission will be meeting on Wednesday, June 20 and the April 18 community forum report will be discussed. The meeting is open to the public and is held at 7 p.m. in Bellefonte Council Chambers.

## **MAYOR'S REPORT:**

Wilson reported on the 2018 Cruise. He commended on how greatly it was run; there was a huge turnout with great weather.

Sunday was the second annual Soap Box Derby on Allegheny Street which included a new event called the Mayor's Cup. Wilson raced and lost immediately. He also attended the Tasting Trail at Talleyrand. It was the second year for that event as well. There was a great turnout there as well. There was a lot of people from outside of the area. All in all, it was a really great weekend for Bellefonte and brought a lot of people to town.

Chief Weaver notified Wilson that they have been patrolling the waterfront and they have issued five warnings so far. There have not been any problems with anyone and it seems that the word is getting out about no fishing from the bank.

## **Quarry Property Update**

Wilson updated Council on the quarry property initiative for recreation purposes. The vision is for a combination Bellefonte Borough/Spring Township walking park, mountain biking park and a climbing area. There are three abandoned quarries in the area. One of the quarries has a renowned climbing crack known throughout the United States. Greymont Lime is partnering on this project and they invited people from the Axis Fund. Axis is a group of attorneys who turn private land into public land for use as public recreation. Representatives from the fund were in town for three days. They were impressed at the potential that the land has that could bring people from near and far to use it. Climbing occurs there now (rope climbing).

The project is put on hold right now. There are quite a few backers of this project. State reps and senators and commissioners, etc. have all backed this project. The project is not dead but is on the back burner. Wilson would like other Council members to see the area. He will contact Greymont Lime to obtain permission to go onto the land. The walk-through will happen at 10 a.m. on July 9 or 10 a.m. July 11, 2018.

Prendergast inquired about what the issue with Greymont is. Wilson stated that it is mostly a liability issue. They wish to keep the mineral rights to the land. The land that is Bellefonte's is under easement. There is signage up there stating that it is illegal to be on the property. Whether that holds any weight, Wilson is not certain. If the liability issue can be removed, there would be a good reason to turn the land over for rec purposes.

Wilson requested permission to schedule about 15 minutes PowerPoint presentation on what the PSU Parks and Recreation students have done with reporting on the possibilities of this land. He will present the materials at July 16, 2018 meeting.

## **BUILDING AND PROPERTY – Point Person, Anne Walker**

### **Parking Lot A Pay Application No. 2 and Change Order No. 2.**

**Walker moved to approve payment number 2 on change order number 2 to the ELA Group in the amount of \$68,865.30 for work completed on parking lot “A”;  
Johnson seconded the motion;**

Prendergast brought up the adjacent church’s dissatisfaction with how the project ended at their property due to damage on their parking lot due to equipment storage on their lot during the construction of Lot A. He was not sure if anything could be done about it. Stewart stated that he could pass this information along. Prendergast spoke with Linda Mundy-Brunn. Holderman stated that it was not part of the project and they paved that for them at no cost. Prendergast stated that it was not paved. Holderman will check on this. Johnson stated that there was damage from staging the equipment in the lot and the contractor agreed to resurface it.

**Motion carried.**

### **Waterfront Walkway Wall Capstone Update**

Walker reported that staff met with the owners of Capstone Precast. The chipping which was caused by contact with salt will be patched. This work will take place in the next month.

Tosti-Vasey stated that this was discussed at the IDA meeting and their hypothesis was that the tractor that was rolling along the water front had residual salt on it. Prendergast believes that this problem was due to excessive salting.

Holderman gave an update on Parking Lot A. The lot is open, but the kiosks have not been installed yet. There is no enforcement in the lot until July 2 but that is dependent upon the kiosks being installed.

## **FINANCE AND GOV'T PERFORMANCE - Point Person, Evan Duffey**

Tosti-Vasey reported that at the agenda planning meeting last week, discussion was held about the possibility of beginning budget planning earlier this year than in the past. This will begin the second meeting in July. That will be a brainstorming session.

## **PARKS AND RECREATION – Point Person, Melissa Hombosky**

### **Pickleball Court update**

Hombosky received a few emails from Curtis Nepper regarding Governor's Park. They have been playing at the park quite a bit. The bench there will be replaced with another bench from the park. They offered to buy a bench, but she is unsure how solid the offer was. She offered that there is an opportunity to teach Council members this sport. They would also like a second court for use – the basketball court. It would take away the option to play basketball if pickleball is played. Johnson stated that sport hierarchy could be used if this happens.

Hombosky stated that an option would be to use the basketball court at Masullo Park, which is not used as much. She stated that she thought they said they could also get two courts on one tennis court by rotating the Pickleball Court layout 90 degrees. She can offer the use of Masullo Park court. They do have a portable net to use. Stewart said that he would take care of this.

### **Mudsill work expected to begin in Talleyrand Park July 9**

The mudsill construction work will begin on July 9.

### **BID OPENING – Pergola Reconstruction Project**

Landserv, Inc., Boalsburg, Pennsylvania \$57,100.00  
John Spearly Construction, Bellefonte, Pennsylvania \$49,000

These will be sent out to the consultant for review. Holderman stated that this is a follow up bid and for construction of only the top of the pergola. Original bid came in at \$59,000 for doing everything; this rebid was for the top of the pergola only.

### **Disc Golf**

Duffey stated that he was approached recently by a resident regarding a possible disc (Frisbee) golf course in one of the parks. Centre Region Parks have one at Bernel, Circleville and one in Boalsburg. He researched the price for a disc golf course (18 holes). Total cost including signage, tees, etc. comes to about \$15,000.00. Nine holes can be installed for about \$7,000.00.

Council discussed the sport and frequency of play and equipment. Discussion was held in asking the group from State College to come down and do a tournament for example. A disc golf course may bring outsiders into Bellefonte to play and patronize local establishments.

#### **HUMAN RESOURCES – Point Person, Renee Brown**

Stewart reported that a Labor Relations meeting has been scheduled to review the upcoming public works contract renewal.

Feedback is needed from Council by June 26 on the Act 35 Plan. Fire Executive Committee meets on the 28<sup>th</sup>.

#### **SAFETY – Point Person, Randy Brachbill**

##### **Letter re: Certification Renewal of Workplace Safety Committee**

Brachbill stated that the certification information needs to be sent to the insurance company.

Stewart reported that Walt Schneider is willing to serve as interim fire chief until Act 35 is reviewed.

#### **WATER/SANITATION – Point Person, Doug Johnson**

Borough Authority Meeting Minutes June 5, 2018 Draft

Johnson reported on the design and construction at the WTP. At the Authority meeting, some items were worked out. A work session is scheduled, and the plans will be reviewed by Authority members and the engineers with the contractor. Covers were approved to be sold a little bit at a time.

Daily Water Withdrawal Report – May 2018

#### **STREETS – Point Person, Jon Eaton**

##### **Motorcycle Spaces created/Central Business District**

The spaces were installed on South Allegheny Street in front of the Courthouse annex. They are being used quite a bit. There are also some located at Pike Alley and in front of the Krider Exchange and some by down by the Talleyrand Park. He also discussed the shortened space at Locust Alley, in an attempt to provide better site distance for people coming out of Locust Alley. The curbing will be painted yellow.

Holderman stated that the new LED lights are being installed around town.

The street vacuum is back out on the street. Johnson thanked staff for getting it back out and it is appreciated.

**ENERGY AND ENVIRONMENTAL CONSERVATION –Point Person, Mike Prendergast**

Nothing to report.

**OLD BUSINESS:**

**Conversion Therapy and LGBT Youth with Sample Ordinance**

Stewart provided sample ordinances on banning conversion therapy for Council consideration. Tosti-Vasey inquired whether Council would like staff to draft an ordinance for review. Brachbill would like to have more information on this topic and perhaps have a presentation or discussion with the opposite side of this movement to have both sides of the story. He stated that he would like a professional to come into a meeting and explain what conversion therapy is and what the process is. Johnson opined that this issue is clearly something that needs to be addressed and did not have an issue with an ordinance. Prendergast said this “therapy” is pseudoscience. Brachbill offered that instead of cherry picking communities to provide ordinances, there should be a law against. Walker added that the practices happen within the confines of specific religious organizations. That is why there is no federal or state law.

Tosti-Vasey stated that information provided by The Williams Institute reported that there are nine states that have issued bans on this practice. Pennsylvania is not one of those states yet. The bans are relative to mental health care providers or who provide this form of “therapy” in exchange for money and there are exemptions on all of the ordinance and state laws for pastoral or religious capacities as long as there is no exchange of money.

Prendergast suggested that since it is not a problem in the Bellefonte area, perhaps a resolution can be done. This was discussed at the prior meeting. Johnson stated that he is certainly not for the therapy, but there are pros and cons to an ordinance. Hombosky is comfortable with a banning ordinance. Brachbill questioned how an ordinance like the ones presented in sample form can be enforced when it becomes a patient/doctor scenario. Although it is not always a patient/doctor relationship, it can be. Eaton stated that this issue is a state issue and that a resolution voicing our opinion should be sent to the Senator and Representative. If the issue is not in Bellefonte, and it is going on elsewhere in the State, that would get the State’s attention to the issue. Brachbill opined that making a resolution or ordinance would create a liability for the Borough.

Hombosky opined that she did not think that there would be any liability attached to an ordinance and that if more communities are telling therapists like this that they are not welcome in their town, then they are going to need a place to go and she does not want them coming to Bellefonte. She is all for a proactive ordinance saying that the therapy providers are not welcome in the Borough.

**Brachbill moved to approve drafting an ordinance for Council review;**

**Prendergast seconded the motion;  
Motion carried.**

### **Pennsylvania Municipal League Sustainability Conference**

Tosti-Vasey and Holderman attended the conference. Tosti-Vasey reported that it was an excellent program put on by the Pennsylvania Municipal League. The keynote session covered how a municipality or borough can obtain certification as a sustainability community. State College just received their platinum certification the day before the conference. In order to begin reviewing the Borough's ability to obtain such a certification, there will need to be more information placed on the website relative to what the Borough does towards creating a sustainable environment in town. If the Borough became a member of the Pennsylvania Municipal League, participating in the municipal internship program could help achieve the certification. Another issue discussed was how to create a sustainability plan through a focus on urban agriculture, community gardening, creating a racial equity program, working towards energy reduction throughout the Borough, e.g., solar energy, and how to leverage vehicle charging stations to revitalize the community. Holderman stated that it was a great seminar and it is always well done.

Discussion was held on joining the Pennsylvania Municipal League. Johnson stated that it may be something to consider along with the PSAB (continued membership). Tosti-Vasey stated that if you are not a member of the PML, seminars can be more expensive than if a member. It is about a 50% discount on training session. Many of them are right in State College so travel expenses will be kept to a minimum. Tosti-Vasey would like to see the Borough join the PML. Holderman and Stewart will try to get them to come in to do a presentation to Council.

### **Pennsylvania State Association of Borough Conference**

The conference was last week. Stewart mentioned in a memo that the safety training was well done. Tosti-Vasey stated that she enjoyed the presentation on the state municipal code. It was a "Jeopardy like" forum. She found the use of social media discussion interesting. The federal district court just ruled that "the interactive space from a tweet from a Twitter account of an elected official constitutes a limited public forum if you are setting is set to public." Basically, this means that nothing can be deleted or edited to the original tweet. The office of open records in Pennsylvania also ruled that social media pages which contain "discussion and prose regarding the activities within the Borough including those related to the police department and Council members constitute public records subject to access under the Right to Know Act."

The Council Association is a subdivision of PSAB which is made up of elected Council members across the state. The other two divisions are for Mayors and Administrative staff. At that meeting, Tosti-Vasey was elected as one of two alternate delegates to the Council Association's executive board representing the western half of the State.

Holderman thanked Council for the opportunity to attend the conference, as it is always a good venue. Stewart and Holderman both attended the administration session. He is grateful for the situation that exists in Bellefonte Borough and the positive things that are going on. He stated that some of the discussions held during the meetings reveal that things are not always so good in other locations around the state.

He also remarked that Deborah Norvell spoke and did an excellent job speaking about respect in a day and age when there are so many viewpoints. She discussed how to be able to respect other people opinions and sit and listen to see what others have to say.

Johnson stated that Rocky Blotter and Cal Ripkin did a great keynote speeches in previous years and Deborah Norvell did a great job on her topic this year. He enjoyed the general sessions. They spoke about local police having radar at one of those sessions. Other current legislation was discussed at the forum. Another topic was opioid addiction. A recovering gentleman, Roger Facer, spoke very eloquently about his recovery process and he is now attending conferences and speaking engagement where he can encourage people to come forward and deal with the addiction. He was an open book.

He also attended best practice in police management. He will share items with the Human Resources Committee and the Mayor at some point in the near future. He remarked that it was a great experience and he was proud to represent Bellefonte. He shared that Holderman's remarks about other boroughs having issues and he too was thankful for Bellefonte and attributed it to Council and the Borough management for making that happen.

Stewart also thanked Council for making it possible for him to attend the conference. He mentioned in his memo relative to security issues. He opined that being proactive is key and that going into budget season this issue of security should be looked at to see what Council can do to make sure that the public servants are safe.

### **2018 Old House Fair**

Brachbill attended Friday night and thought the speaker did a fantastic job. There was a nice turnout. Holderman interjected that Joseph Griffin and his committee did a great job and put in a lot of work to put it on. He also attended Friday. Wilson attended Friday too. He too remarked that it was a good turnout.

Tosti-Vasey attended both session days. She also thanked Griffin who represented the BHCA, Mary Sorenson from the Centre County Historical Society and Ken Martin from the Philatelic Society for spearheading and organizing the two-day event.

Friday's session focused on "Creative Place-Making". This was an idea that connect people in the community through the use of arts and history to approve the quality of life in town.

Saturday was filled with workshops for people who own or would like to own older or historic homes. She attended Victorian Garden plants, Code Enforcement, and the Historic Districts Workshop.

Holderman interjected that many of the place-making tasks are already being brought to the town as proposed by Hombosky; i.e., yarn bombing, First Sunday. Hombosky was unable to attend due to a conflict.

### **PSAB Trustee Meeting/ Trustee Education Memo**

Memo from Stewart regarding the trustee meeting. They reviewed the pension plans offered through the association and unemployment compensation fund as well. He thanked Council for the opportunity to serve and attend.

### **Leadership Centre County**

Tosti-Vasey explained the Leadership Centre County program. They offer information to create greater networking and leadership among non-profits, government, and private businesses in the County. It is a nine-month training program and Hombosky attended the largest class. The graduation dinner ceremony was held last week. (applause).

### **Bellefonte Cruise Comments**

Johnson attended the Cruise on Friday and Saturday and they did a “super job.” Borough staff did a great day of getting the streets cleaned and the Borough was prepared for it.
